

### **Bible Reading Challenge**

In 1522 Martin Luther translated the entire New Testament from Greek into German in 11 weeks. Will you take up the challenge of reading it in English within 95 days, or a little longer than 11 weeks?

Our journey will follow the route which the Gospel likely took as it moved from one culture to the next, and the church developed as it met new challenges.

We will begin August 20 and conclude by Thanksgiving, November 22, 2017. Of course, if you need more time to complete the journey, that's okay too.

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## Our Journey Through the New Testament

#### Part One: An Overview of the Story: Acts

As you read the story of the Gospel's spread from Jerusalem to Rome, look for markers that highlight the growth of the Word and the growth of the church.

#### <u>Part Two</u>: The Gospel in Jewish soil: Matthew and James

Note the careful structure of the Gospel--A powerful prolog showing Jesus as the Christ with an equally powerful climax with the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus. In between are five discourses preceded by deeds anticipating the discourses, which in turn interpret the deeds.

#### <u>Part Three</u>: The Gospel Moves to Turkey: Galatians, Luke, Colossians, and Philemon

Galatians emphasizes how all are saved through faith, but faith goes to work. Luke highlights the universal character of Jesus' ministry; Colossians shows Him as our all-sufficient Savior; Philemon reflects the transformation Jesus makes in lives.

Here we sense the challenge of living in a pagan environment, whether Philippi or Corinth. In the Thessalonian letters we see how the Christian hope needs to express itself.

Part Eight: Our Journey reaches its climax with the Gospel according to St. John and the Revelation given to him. Please watch for the signs Jesus does and their meaning; note also the significant "I Am" statements of Jesus, the Upper Room discourses, and how Jesus is shown to be the Christ. As you read the Revelation do not let the unusual symbolism puzzle you; rather see it as a sign of the victory Christ has won over the forces of darkness.
